Omaha art center fires 5 in 'restructuring'; workers say it's retaliation for union talks

ive workers at The Union for Contemporary Art were fired Tuesday, the same day that employees informed management of the Omaha arts center that they were seeking voluntary recognition as a union.

Workers seeking to organize said in an Instagram post that they view the firings as retaliation for their unionization efforts. The union organizers staged a walkout Tuesday and are demanding that the employees be reinstated.

But the leader of the arts center said the terminations were not related to the union organizing but were part of a restructuring.

"They were not fired because of the unionizing efforts," Lakesha Green, executive director of The Union for Contemporary Art, said by email.

She said she had found out about the union organizing on social media and by email Tuesday.

The five workers who were fired were one third of the 15 full-time staff at the arts center, said Jessica Freeman, exhibitions and resideWorkness manager at The Union for Contemporary Art and a member of the union organizing committee. She said the center also has four part-time workers.

Freeman was not one of the five who were let go.

The Union for Contemporary Art is a non-profit arts center at 24th and Lake Streets that includes a gallery, workshop and performing arts spaces. It provides free cultural programming to North Omaha young people and others; produces theater works for the stage; supports artists through fellowships, exhibitions and other programs; and has a community garden and outdoor classroom.

It is supported by local corporate foundations, philanthropists and government grants.

The workers, calling themselves The Union Union, are affiliating with the Communication Workers of America Denver Newspaper Guild Local 37074. The unionized journalists of the Omaha World-Herald Guild are part of the CWA.

"We wanted to organize ourselves into a union in response to the changes that are going on in the world today," Freeman said. "There's just a lot of uncertainty. We've had some leadership changes at The Union (for Contemporary Art) and we want to make sure we have a voice at the table."

She said the organizers were planning to send an email to Green and the arts center's board and to hand-deliver a letter to Green Tuesday. Freeman said that

two employees were terminated early Tuesday morning, before she and a coworker delivered the email and letter were delivered.

"We caught wind of that, we emailed the letter right away and we tried to deliver it in person," Freeman said. "We were unable to, and then in the hours that have followed since then, three more people have been let go."

The employees who were fired had signed union cards and have been involved in the union organizing effort, Freeman said. There had been no discussions of possible layoffs or terminations before Tuesday that she was aware of, she said.

"The timing does seem very aggressive for these firings, and it seems a little convenient that it all happened today," Freeman said.

Green sent a written statement that said, "After careful consideration and evaluation of our organization's sustainability, we have made the difficult decision to implement a restructuring process. Unfortunately, this means that some valued members of our team will be impacted.

"This decision was not made lightly, and we recognize the significant contributions of every individual who has been part of our journey.

Green said the arts center would be offering resources and assistance to help the terminated employees navigate their next steps.

"While this moment is difficult, we believe these changes are necessary to ensure the long-term stability and impact of The Union for Contemporary Art," she said.

Green wrote that the arts center will continue to serve North Omaha with dedication and purpose.

"We appreciate the support of our artists, partners, and patrons as we move forward, and we are confident that this restructuring will allow us to grow stronger and more sustainable in the years to come," she said.

Green's statement and the union organizer's Instagram post both cited The Union for Contemporary Art's vision statement, which says that the organization's mission is to strengthen the cultural and social landscape of its community by using the arts as a vehicle to inspire positive social change.
